Grammar reminder Position of adjectives

Most adjectives in French come after the noun, unlike in English. For example:

- la jupe rouge - the red skirt
- c'est un dessert anglais - it's an English dessert

Agreement of adjectives

An adjective is a word that describes a noun. In French, adjectives must agree with their noun, which means that they have to show whether they are masculine or feminine and singular or plural to match the noun.

Il y a deux postes jaunes - There are two yellow post offices.

Christmas Presents - Les Cadeaux de Noël

In some parts of France, Christmas comes early when Father Christmas, [le Père Noël](#), brings small gifts and sweets for children on December 6th, the feast day of Saint-Nicolas (celebrated in the North and Northeast).

In other parts of the country, children place their shoes by the fire and wake up on Christmas Day to find them filled with presents from [le Père Noël](#) and fruit, nuts and small toys hanging on the tree. Christmas Day is mainly a day of celebration for children.

While they all open their Christmas presents, [les Cadeaux de Noël](#) on this day, not all parents do - some are patient and wait until New Year's Eve, [la Saint-Sylvestre](#), which is more of an adult celebration.
