

Key vocabulary to remember and use in your learning

MovieMaker	Software that allows you to edit movies.
upload	To transfer data from one device to another.
narration	The voice-over that accompanies a movie or animation.
audio	The sound in a movie or animation.
trim	'Cutting' out unwanted parts of a video.
script	The written text of a play, film or broadcast.
camera	wide shot— shows subject with surroundings
angles	close-up—shows subject close and in detail
	mid shot— a waist shot at medium distance
	pan—moving the camera horizontally
	zoom—going from a wide to close-up shot

Making Movies

Key knowledge to know and use

- A storyboard is helpful as it allows you to plan, order and fit everything in you want.
- Scripting and rehearsing parts that are being narrated or presented to camera will help you deliver them better.
- Editing and using trim tools will lead to a more engaging movie.
- Evaluate the film and make improvements, thinking about the audience.
- The features of a good film, e.g. title, pictures/logos, transitions, narration/voice-over, background music, video, presenting to camera, captions, a mix of media, camera angles.
- Understand that not everything they read is true or without bias.
- Understand that bias can mislead readers, and that there are multiple perspectives to many stories.

Pinewood Studios

Located in Buckinghamshire, Pinewood Studios is the largest film-making studio in the UK. Many famous films have been 'shot' here, from early classics like Goldfinger (James Bond—1964) and Chitty Chitty Bang Bang (1968) to more modern films like Antman & Wasp: Quantumania (2023).
